1. BACKGROUND

The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) has been implementing its Alternative Development (AD) program in Hopong and Loilem townships, Southern Shan State, Myanmar, since 2014 which adopts a territorial approach that integrates social and environmental considerations to strengthen the licit economy. However, recent natural disasters and security challenges linked to opium poppy cultivation have exacerbated socio-economic vulnerabilities, particularly among women.

Women in these communities face distinct challenges, including livelihood loss, displacement, restricted access to resources, and limited participation in decision-making. To address these issues, UNODC has proposed a pilot project targeting villages affected by security challenges and population displacement. The initiative aims to support economic recovery while fostering resilience and stability.

Recognizing the unique socio-economic barriers faced by women in opium cultivation areas, the project will focus on establishing and strengthening women groups to enhance their capacities and promote sustainable alternative livelihoods. Understanding gender-specific constraints is crucial for designing effective, evidence-based interventions. To this end, UNODC seeks to engage a contractor to conduct an in-depth assessment of gender dynamics and socio-economic barriers in the affected communities. The findings will inform future programming and contribute to the development of inclusive, gender-responsive strategies.

Field Assessment**: Conduct interviews, focus group discussions, and surveys with women and other relevant stakeholders to collect primary data.
- **4. Data Analysis**: Analyze gender-specific constraints to accessing resources, economic opportunities, decision-making processes, and social protection mechanisms **5. Report Preparation**: Develop a comprehensive assessment report detailing findings, key challenges, and recommendations for gender-responsive interventions that promote sustainable livelihoods, social inclusion, and resilience among women in affected areas. **6. Presentation of Findings**: Present findings to relevant stakeholders for validation and discussion.
